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G. A. Zochs Wed in Taylor, Make Home Here

TAYLOR, Feb. 20 (ANS) — Mr. and Mrs. Glenn Arthur Zoch are making their home at 915 West 2nd Street in Austin after their marriage here last Sunday in the Trinity Lutheran Church.

Mrs. Zoch, the former Miss Barbara Nell Bass, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Aubrey L. Bass of Fort Worth. She is a sophomore geology student at the University of Texas, and was in Arlington State College in Arlington for her freshman year. She studied French in Laval University in Quebec last summer.

Mr. Zoch, son of the Rev. and Mrs. G. A. Zoch of Taylor, attended Texas Lutheran College in Seguin after his graduation from Thrall High School. He is a senior radio broadcasting major at the University of Texas, where he expects to graduate in June. He is a member of the Men's Independent Campus Association at the University, while his bride is a member of the Women's Independent Campus Association.

The double-ring ceremony was performed by the father of the bridegroom. The church was decorated in silver and pink. C. Reginald Taylor played the organ, and accompanied the soloist of Miss Anne Louise Zoch, only sister of the bridegroom.

Miss Rebecca Sandlin of Fort Worth and Miss Dorothy Dietrick of Houston were the bridesmaids. They were dressed like the maid of honor and carried bouquets of pink carnations showered with silver streamers.
