Mrs. J. E. Burnett at the organ, sang, "Because I Love You," and then played the wedding march from Lohengrin during which time the attendants took their places at the altar. "I Love You Truly," was sung softly by Miss Bessie Thiele as the bride and groom came down the flower covered aisle to take their place with the attendants at the beautiful altar decorated with chrysanthemums and sword ferns.
