The church was beautifully decorated with arrangement of white gladioll and white asters in standing containers on the sides of the altar. Fern trees formed the background for the bridal party. White tapers in candelabra were on either aide of the altar which held a center arrangement of white gladioll and asters. The pews were marked with white satin ribboo, illies of the valley and net.

The bride, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. M. C. Gruetzner is an honor graduate of Giddings High School and attended Blinn College at Brenham where she was a member of Phi Tricta Kappa and Gamma Delta. She is bookkeeper at Lee Memorial Hospital.

The groom, son of Rev. and Mrs. Arthur Arnott of Giddings, also is a graduate of Giddings High School and received his Bachelor's Degree in Music Education from Sam Houston State Teachers College this mouth.

Mrs. Emmett Hannes, organist, presented the wedding music and also accompanied Mrs. M. C. Schroeder, soloist as she sang 'The Wedding Prayer' and 'The Lord's Prayer.''

The bride, given in marriage by her father, was gowned in a formal wedding dress of imported chantilly lace and tulle over white satin. The fitted bodice of lace was cut in a point both back and front and the edge was finished in a hand rolled cord of lace. The high neckline was finished with a stand-up collar of lace and the pattern of the lace formed a scalloped edge around the collar. Long sieeves came to petal points over the hands and tiny covered buttons fastened the dress down the back to below the waistline.

The full skirt of talle, over white satin was worn over crinolines. Scalloped bands of lace insertion were set into the skirt and extended down the back to form a chapel length train.

Her fingertip veil of imported silk illusion fell from a half hat of pleated tulle embroidered in iridescent sequins and seed pearls. She wore small pearl earrings.

The brides flowers formed a colonial bouquet of Frenched carnations centered with a yellow throated white orchid with lillies of the valley and satin ribbon and nylon net.

Miss Jane Winkler of Giddings served the bride as maid of honor. Bridesmaids were Miss Adeline Gruetzner of Pasadena, Mrs. Herbert Carleston Jr. of San Marcos, and Mrs. Robert Gruetzner of Elgin. They were gowned identically in Berman blue taffeta dresses. The top of the bodices had a circular fold pleated in narrow bands to form a round yoke back and front, extending over the shoulders to form cap sleeves. Their full floor length skirts, worn over crinolines had a big bow of matching taffets in the back, forming a bustle effect.

Their hair line was covered by a band of matching taffets, and they carried colonial bouquets of red delight roses with satin streamers and nylon net. The attendants jewelry were Rhimestone recklaces and earrings.

A reception was held immediately following the ceremony at the home of the bride's parents where a buffet supper was served on the lawn.

The wedding cake was a three tier confection decorated with sugared roses with two large sugared wedding bells on the top tier. The brides table was laid with a white linen cloth and held-hurrieane lamps in styrofoam decorated with satin ribbon, illies of the valley and net. The attendants bouquets were also placed on the bride's table.

In the houseparty were Mra. Eugene Winkler of Giddings in Milton Behrend of Houston, Mrs. Bobby Lorenz of Giddings, and Mrs. Iyan Alspaw of Austin.

For her daughters wedding Mrs. Gruetzner wore a French blue lace dress over taffeta made with a V neckline and short sleeves. The skirt was softly flared. She wore a mauve hat and gloves and her shoes were linted to match her dress. Her corsage was of baby orchids.

The groom's mother, Mrs. Arthur Arndt wore a pink lace dress made with a trimmed neckline, short sleeves and softly flared skirt. Her accessories were white with a white carnation corange.

For going away the brids wore an imported linen suit, made with a long torso jacket and straight line skirt. The jacket was trimmed in a portrait collar in white and her hat was a small white embroidered pique shell. She wore white gloves and her

shoes were brown and while spectators. She wore an orchid. After a wedding trip to Colorado the couple will reside in Giddings for the present time.
