**HENDERSON - BOUCHIER
WEDDING AT TAYLOR**

Miss Jean Bouchier, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. F. L. Bouchier, and Lieut. Harvey Earl Henderson of Foster Field, Victoria, were married in a beautiful ceremony Saturday at eight p. m., at the St. James Episcopal church.

The church was decorated in an all white floral theme with tall baskets of daisies on either side of the altar before a bank of palms and floor candelabra were placed just within the chancel rail. Vases of the daisies were used on the altar and here again the candelabra holding white candles were used.

Mrs. E. R. Todd gave a program of music including "Traumerel" by Schumann and

"Evening Star" by Wagner. Lieut. C. E. Frank sang "Oh Perfect Love" by Barnby and Mrs. Todd also played the traditional wedding marches. During the ceremony she played "Ave Maria" by Schubert.

Miss Helen Bouchier, only sister of the bride, was maid of honor and entered just after the candles were lighted. She wore frosted white organdie, made with long torso blouse, square neck edged with a tiny ruffle, floor length skirt. Her hat, a poke shape, was of the same material as the dress and her flowers were mixed pastels in a colonial bouquet.

Traditional White

The bride in traditional white, entered with her father, who gave her in marriage. Her dress was of starched chiffon and

lace, the blouse fitted of lace and with sweetheart neck and long fitted sleeves. The skirt was very full and lace insertion trimmed. Her fingertip veil of illusion was fastened at the head with tiara of orange blossom. She carried a white prayer book topper with a white orchid and showered with lilies of the valley. For something old she wore a layalliere that had belonged to her mother.

The couple will make their home in Victoria where the groom is stationed with the Army Air Corps.
