



## Mr. Wiede-Miss Meyer Wed Sept. 22 In Ceremony At Immanuel Lutheran

White blossoms, green foliage, and tall white tapers transformed the Immanuel Lutheran Church in Clifton into a candlelit bower when nuptial vows were exchanged between Miss Geraldine Meyer, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bennie H. Meyer, and Mr. Harold O. Wiede, son of Mrs. Adolph Wiede and the late Mr. Wiede, in a double-ring ceremony at 7:00 o'clock on Saturday night, September 22, with Reverend Carl H. Mutschink officiating.

Masses of white chrysanthemums banked the altar of the Church. In front of the chancel tall baskets of white gladioli alternated with seven-branch, wrought-iron candelabra which held tall white tapers. Tall green palms decorated the walls of the Church, and down the center, on which a white aisle cloth was laid for the wedding party's approach to the altar, large cathedral tapers and white satin ribbon marked the reserved pew entrances.

Preceding the ceremony Mr. C. T. Schoessow, of Houston, gave an organ prelude of nuptial music. Prior to the ceremony, while "Always" was being played, Messrs. Ralph Wiede, of Harlingen, and Walter Hirsch, of Houston, lighted the white tapers. Immediately preceding the ceremony Mr. Harold Pierce, of Waco, sang "O Promise me". As the processional Mr. Schoessow rendered the "Bridal March" from "Lohengrin" by Wagner and for the recessional the "Wedding March" by Mendelssohn.

The bride, who was given in marriage by her father, was attired in a bridal gown of white burmil satin, designed with a yoke of nylon net outlined with Chantilly lace. From her fitted bodice the full skirt of her gown swept into a cathedral-length train. The long fitted sleeves extended to points at the wrists. Her finger-tip veil of bridal illusion, edged with Chantilly lace, was caught to a tiara of seed pearls and orange blossoms. The bride carried a white prayer book topped with a white orchid. In accordance with tradition, she wore something old, something new, something borrowed, and something blue and, for luck, a penny in her shoe. Her only jewelry was a double strand of Marvella pearls and matching ear screws.

Maid of honor was the bride's cousin, Mrs. Gordon Saunders, of Dallas. She wore a gown of Nile green net over taffeta and carried a bouquet of bronze chrysanthemums.

The bridesmaids, Miss Ann Anderson and Mrs. Oscar Hampe, of Clifton, Mrs. Leon Humphries, of Ballinger, and Miss Alice Wiede, of Houston, were attired in gowns of pink, orchid, aqua, and yellow, respectively, and had nosegays of yellow and pink gladioli.

Little Miss Julia Lee Saunders, of Dallas, the flower girl, was gowned in a dress of pink taffeta and wore a halo of white flowers.

Mr. Roland Wiede, of Clifton, served his brother as best man, and ushers were Messrs. Leon Humphries, of Ballinger, cousin of the bride, and Richard Kent Jr., of Houston, brother-in-law of the groom. The men in the bridal party were dressed in dark suits.

Master Richard Kent III, of Houston, nephew of the groom, served as ringbearer and wore dark trousers, a white jacket, and a black bow-tie.

The bride's mother was attired in a royal blue velvet dress with beige and brown accessories, and the groom's mother was gowned in gray crepe with black accessories. Both mothers wore pink carnation corsages.

#### Reception Follows Wedding

Immediately following the ceremony a reception was held in the home of the bride's parents in Clifton. Those persons included in the house party were Miss Deloris Lehrmann, cousin of the bride, at

the guest register; Mesdames R. C. Womack Jr. and Bill Mitchell, ladling punch; Mrs. Wallace Stolhmann, sister of the groom, serving the cake; and Mesdames Walter Hirsch and Thomas Joe Humphries, greeting the guests and showing the gifts.

The bridal table was laid with a white linen cutwork cloth. The bridesmaids' nosegays formed the centerpiece with tall green tapers in crystal candlesticks on either side. The beautiful three-tiered wedding cake, iced in white, was decorated with white sugar-spun wedding bells and mint-green leaves and topped with a miniature bride and groom. Lime sherbet punch also was served.

#### Leave For Wedding Trip

When the young couple left on their wedding trip to New Mexico and Arizona, Mrs. Wiede was wearing a brown gabardine suit with a beige blouse, hat, and gloves, and her slippers and bag were of brown alligator. She also had a white orchid corsage.

Mrs. Wiede is a graduate of Clifton High School and for the past several years has held a position with the Community Public Service Company here; she plans to continue her duties with that Company. Mr. Wiede is a graduate of Meridian High School and, during World War II, served with the United States Marine Corps in the South Pacific.
